

## Preference for Bolidt proves to be justified once again



Perron-3, the social cultural centre in Rosmalen, will not feel lonely any time soon. It is very popular among the inhabitants of this little village that, however, already exists 350 years longer than the large city 's Hertogenbosch! From an architectural point of view, it was a beautiful project to, meant respectfully, 'play' with. To create a both creative, artistic and attractive, social atmosphere was the two-sided challenge. Architect bureau Jonkman Klinkhamer was bold enough to play the game and decided, not for the first time, to play it together with Bolidt. Since their cooperation during several projects like the City Theatre of Amsterdam and the [FleHITE museum](#) in Amersfoort, the architect bureau is highly impressed by Bolidt's unprecedented possibilities. This time was no exception: to call in a specialist like Bolidt was once again an act of wisdom. The architects had a range of colours in mind that required a significant amount of work from a specialist. Especially for this project, Bolidt developed new colours based on the existing [Bolidtop](#)® systems, accurately matching the design of Jonkman Klinkhamer. In addition, Bolidt installed a membrane in the basement, because the groundwater level exceeds the level of the actual floor. Now, the Bolidtop® 525 shows off its beautiful colours. All set, the game is over and Perron-3 has been launched. So, as they say in artistic circles: toitoitoi!
